Third Doses

Third doses are available to individuals most at risk of serious illness, including individuals who are severely immunocompromised:

 Transplant recipients (including solid organ transplant and hematopoietic stem cell transplants)





- Patients with hematological cancers (examples include lymphoma, myeloma, leukemia) on active treatment (chemotherapy, targeted therapies, immunotherapy)
- Recipients of an anti-CD20 agent (examples include rituximab, ocrelizumab, ofatumumab)
- Residents of long-term care homes, highest-risk retirement homes.

Eligibility

- All individuals born in 2009 or earlier are now eligible to drop-in to any clinic or neighbourhood vaccine hub for their first or second dose appointment, at least 28 days after receiving an mRNA vaccine.
- Immunocompromised residents who meet the criteria above can speak to their specialist or hospital program to ask for a letter to receive a third dose. The third dose of vaccine will be given at least two months after the second dose and will match the vaccine received as the second dose
- Residents of long-term care homes and highest risk retirement homes will also be
 offered a third dose of vaccination at an interval of at least five months after the
 second dose. Ottawa Public Health is working with long-term care homes and
 highest risk retirement homes directly to offer a third dose to residents in those
 settings.

Community Vaccination Clinics (Mass Immunization Clinics)

Open to all Ottawa residents born in 2009 or earlier.

Residents can drop-in to any community clinics in Ottawa to receive a COVID-19 vaccine without an appointment.

Vaccinations are currently available at the following community clinics

Community clinics will accept drop-ins for first and second doses, no appointments necessary, between 12:45 pm and 7 pm, Tuesday to Friday, and between 9:45 am and 4 pm on Saturdays.

Appointment Availability

 Residents looking for a first or second dose, are able to book an appointment online through the <u>provincial booking tool</u> or drop-in into any clinic. They are also encouraged to contact their local pharmacy.





Mobile Options

- Mobile Pop-ups aim to reduce barriers to vaccine access, making it easier and more accessible for specific populations and groups to receive their first and second doses.
- Mobile vaccination teams are providing vaccinations to congregate care settings, including shelters and homebound residents, and providing support for administration of 3rd dose in Long Term Care Homes and Highest-Risk Retirement Homes.
- Mobile vaccine clinic requests: workplaces, community organizations, places of worship and other groups can request a mobile vaccination team to administer first and second doses of the COVID-19 vaccine on-site, at their own location.
 - This program is intended to help reduce barriers for residents who have not yet received the vaccine by working with community leaders to provide comfortable, convenient and easily accessible options for vaccination.
- Homebound residents: We continue to actively work with health partners to support in-home vaccination of homebound healthcare recipients.
 - Homebound clients can request in-home vaccination by themselves, by their caregiver, or by referral from their primary care provider by calling the OPH Vaccine Booking Line at 613-691-5505 Option #2. We are defining a homebound resident as: an individual who has medical, physical, cognitive, or psychosocial needs/conditions that inhibit them from visiting a local clinic, pharmacy, or their primary care provider to receive their COVID-19 vaccination.

Neighbourhood Vaccination Hubs

 <u>Neighbourhood Vaccination Hubs</u> consist of small immunization teams available in high priority neighbourhoods working with our community health partners. The aim is to address barriers and include more regular micro and hyperlocal vaccine options







making it more convenient and accessible for people - to meet people where they live, work and play, in the language they speak.

 Locations within these neighbourhoods are chosen based on discussions with community partners and availability of space. These teams are available to establish a community presence, and are available to answer questions, provide vaccine information and administer vaccinations. This is in addition to supplementary community engagement being conducted door to door and through community groups.

General Information

For up-to-date information on COVID-19 vaccination in Ottawa, including the number of doses administered and vaccination coverage rates, visit OPH's <u>COVID-19 Vaccination</u> Dashboard.

- Ottawa has administered 1,558,229 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine.
- 87% of Ottawa residents age 12 and over have received at least one dose and 80% have received two doses.
- In the last 3 weeks, an average of 5,323 first doses were administered weekly to Ottawa residents. Given that the current coverage level is 788,844, it is projected that 90% of Ottawa's 12+ eligible population (830,476) would have received at least one dose by the end of the week of October 17.
- More than 200 pharmacies across Ottawa are also receiving vaccines directly from the Province. Participating locations are available on <u>Ontario.ca</u>. Some Ottawa pharmacies ask to book appointments ahead of time and others allow walk-ins.





Eligible residents should check with the pharmacy directly. Select primary care teams are also offering vaccines.

Residents are encouraged to follow announcements on the Ottawa Public Health
websites and social media channels, and from local news media. Residents can also
sign up for the <u>COVID-19 vaccination update e-subscription</u> for regular news on the
vaccine roll-out.
